California's Health Care Landscape: From Threats of Repeal to Promises of Universal Coverage

California's uninsured rate is at a historic low due to California's proactive implementation of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), which has expanded coverage to an additional seven million Californians. Over the past year, Congress and the Trump Administration pursued multiple attempts to dismantle and repeal the ACA while California considered various proposals to expand coverage for specific populations. Larry Levitt will discuss looming federal threats to weaken the Affordable Care Act, as well as options to move California closer to universal coverage.

Larry Levitt is Senior Vice President for Health Reform at the Kaiser Family Foundation and Senior Advisor to the President of the Foundation. Among other duties, he is Co-Executive Director of the Program for the Study of Health Reform and Private Insurance. He previously was Editor-in-Chief of kaisernetwork.org, the Foundation's online health policy news and information service, and directed the Foundation's communications and online activities and its Changing Health Care Marketplace Project.

He previously served as a Senior Health Policy Advisor to the White House and Department of Health and Human Services and was the Special Assistant for Health Policy with California Insurance Commissioner John Garamendi.

Written Off - A Personal Struggle with Opioids

The rate of drug overdose deaths in our nation continue to worsen with opioid-involved overdoses accounting for two-thirds of all drug overdose deaths. Written Off is a documentary that depicts the story of Matt Edwards' struggle with addiction based on journals from the last two years of his life. What began with pills prescribed by a doctor for a botched toe surgery, led to years of addiction and countless attempts to quit. In addition to featuring segments of the documentary, the plenary will also include a discussion with Molly Hermann, producer, writer, and director of Written Off and Jane Funk, Matt's mother, around intimate experiences with addiction.

Molly Hermann is an award-winning producer, writer, and director who tells stories with focus, passion and clarity. Molly is driven by a keen curiosity and a natural ability to connect with people on a level that gets at the heart and meaning of any story—from the tiniest amazing detail to the big questions that reveal, embolden, and enlighten. Molly is the co-founder of the documentary production company The Biscuit Factory.



Jane Funk *Written Off*Documentary

Jane Funk's role in the documentary film *Written Off* helps viewers experience the profoundly personal tragedy of the opioid epidemic. She was not always proud but rather a frustrated, angry, and uninformed mother of a drug addict. Her journey from frustration to dignity for her son began after his death—she found and read his journals. These journals explained what addicts so desperately want to tell others but can't due to stigma and institutionalized arrogance. *What I Couldn't Tell You, One Man's Struggle with Opioid Addiction*, the journals, is now published and available for anyone to read.

In March 23, 2015, Karen Smith, MD, MPH, was sworn in as director of the California Department of Public Health and state public health officer. Dr. Smith is a physician specializing in infectious disease and public health. Prior to her appointment, Smith served as public health officer and deputy director at the Napa County Health and Human Services Agency beginning in 2004. She was also on medical staff for infectious disease at Queen of the Valley Medical Center in Napa from 2012 to 2014.

Public Health Approach to Violence: Opportunities for California Local Health Departments

Garen J. Wintemute, MD, MPH, is a pioneer in the field of injury epidemiology and firearm violence prevention. As an emergency room physician and director of the University of California, Davis Violence Prevention Research Program and University of California Firearm Violence Research Center, Wintemute will detail forthcoming data on violence – from suicide to interpersonal violence to mass shootings. Given that the public health approach to violence is a CHEAC organizational priority, Wintemute will present potential strategies and opportunities for LHDs to prevent and control injury, disability, and death caused by violence throughout California.

Dr. Wintemute has conducted and published findings from numerous studies on gun accessibility, connections between gun ownership and violence, and related topics. He has testified before Congress and served as a consultant for the National Institute of Justice; the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms; and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

His longstanding commitment to understand the nature of firearm violence and ts underlying causes has produced a uniquely rich and informative body of research on firearm violence that directly improves the health and safety of Americans and has positioned California and UC Davis as national leaders in efforts to break the cycle of gun violence.


