Day camps are defined as those providing group experiences for children under 18 during the day and on days when school is not regularly in session for a minimum of four hours per day on three or more consecutive days. Day camps are categorized into two tiers. Tier one camps offer either food service, multiple programs, or single focus programs that involve but are not limited to firearms, challenge courses, archery or power tools. Food service is defined as either on-site food preparation or the distribution of non-prepackaged, potentially hazardous foods. Tier two camps are single focus and offer no food service. Day camps are allowed to transport campers for activities at parks, beaches, campsites, and other locations, and allowed to provide offsite field trips for no more than three consecutive days (including overnight). Organized day camps are required to be either accredited by the American Camp Association (ACA) or to have a written description of their operating procedures. These operating procedures must include 1) supervisor qualifications/training and verification from the camp of the camp director's and camp staff criminal background checks, 2) staff skill verification criteria and process, 3) participant eligibility requirements, 4) staff-to-participant supervision ratios, 5) equipment needed, 6) safety procedures, and 7) emergency procedures. Requires day camps to obtain a <u>health and sanitation permit</u> from local enforcement agencies (LEAs). Requires any tier one day camp that provides food service to be a licensed food facility. Requires every camper and each staffer to provide a health history that is completed and signed and to be kept onsite. Requires local enforcement agencies to issue a day camp health and sanitation permit upon receipt of a copy of the written operating procedures for the day camp or verification of accreditation by the ACA. For Tier one camps, verification that the LEA has conducted an initial inspection of the premises to verify compliance with health and sanitation standards is also required. LEAs may inspect day camps, issue citations, and secure evidence from a day camp and charge a fee for that purpose. The LEA shall provide, within 14 days, a summary of any violation of health and sanitation standards, including but not limited to, water supply, drinking water, handwashing facilities, showers, toilets, swimming facilities, garbage and refuse, and food facilities. Day camps may be cited for failing to meet any requirements and LEAs must acknowledge receipt of the plans within 30 days. Day camps may appeal a citation to the local enforcement agency who must then respond within 30 business days. Any person alleging health or sanitation violations may file a complaint with the LEA; local enforcement agencies are required to investigate any complaint received and may charge a fee for any oversight activity mandated by the bill.
